

4. Popular Software Tutorials

Wisconsin residents can now access **LearningExpress "Popular Software Tutorials."** These are self-paced online tutorials on the most commonly used applications (including Word, Excel, etc.) and operating systems. The tutorials, available for basic to advanced levels, include fully interactive multimedia; sound, animation and visual demonstrations, along with quizzes and hands-on practice lab simulations.

Wisconsin Library Services (WiLS) purchased the tutorials using funds awarded through a Library Services and Technology Act grant. To make the materials easy for patrons and librarians to find and use, they've been integrated with the LearningExpress Library available on the BadgerLink website: (http://www.badgerlink.net).

5. Five Trends Affecting Libraries Worldwide

As the world's leading global library organization, the International Federation of Library Associations and Institutions (IFLA) undertook a comprehensive study process to provide its membership with a basis for discussion about advancing libraries as learning centers for the communities they serve. The sheer volume of information and the speed at which it is being created online is one of the focal points of the IFLA Trend Report. The resulting report is the result of twelve months' consultation with experts and stakeholders from a range of disciplines to explore and discuss emerging trends in the new information environment. It is described not as a static report, but a dynamic and evolving set of online resources for library and information professionals to contribute to at trends.ifla.org. There's a great depth of data already on the online platform for libraries to use, share and build on, including a bibliography and literature review of existing trend reports, expert papers and discussion summaries.

While the site is built for collaboration by members, the summary "Insights Document" pulls together and summarizes all of the information contained on the Trend Report website for IFLA members. It identifies five high level trends and considers possible future "collision points" between trends affecting the role and identity of libraries:

TREND 1: New technologies will both expand and limit who has access to information.

TREND 2: Online education will democratize and disrupt global learning.

TREND 3: The boundaries of privacy and data protection will be redefined.

TREND 4: Hyper-connected societies will listen to and empower new voices and groups.

TREND 5: The global information environment will be transformed by new technologies.

7. Wisconsin's Digital Library App & Upcoming Big Library Read

OverDrive recently released the new OverDrive Media Console 3.0 app for Android & iPhone. The new OMC 3.0 app will work on Apple devices with iOS 6(or newer) and on Android devices with OS 4.0(or newer). To get familiar with the new features, a recorded webinar (30 min.) and slides are available on OverDrive's Learning Center. OverDrive Help and the video series for Android and iOS are also updated with information about the new version, so patrons have resources available to them as well.

From September 16-30, 2013, Wisconsin's Digital Library will be participating in the OverDrive Big Library Read featuring "Nancy Clancy, Super Sleuth" by Jane O'Conner. Big Library Read is a program designed to demonstrate the valuable role public and school libraries play in helping readers discover books and authors. It is a worldwide digital version of a local book club, and an opportunity for each library to generate more interest in its digital collection. During those dates, the title will be featured on the digital library site and all card holders can borrow the title at any time (simultaneous use in all digital formats, no waiting list). A marketing kit is available for you to spread the word to your community and invite them to participate in the Big Library Read. The marketing kit includes a press release template, poster, bookmark, and web graphic. During the

Big Library Read program, OverDrive will measure title impressions, views, checkouts, and social media interaction to further its advocacy efforts for libraries.

9. Best Small Library in America Award

Library Journal is seeking nominations for our annual Best Small Library in America award. Cosponsored by the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation, the award was founded to encourage and showcase the exemplary work of these libraries. Now in its tenth year, the award honors the public library that most profoundly demonstrates outstanding service to populations of 25,000 or less (follow links for eligibility requirements).

The winning library will receive a \$20,000 cash award, a feature story in the February 1, 2014 *Library Journal*, membership and conference costs for two library representatives to attend the Public Library Association Biannual Conference in 2014 in Indianapolis, IN, and a gala reception at the conference.



Two finalist libraries will be awarded a \$10,000 cash award as well as membership and conference costs for two library representatives to attend the PLA conference and the gala reception in 2014.

The postmark deadline for nominations is October 14, 2013.

10. Patron Seed Share Programs

A handful of libraries across the state now allow residents to share seeds, and other libraries are studying the results to decide whether they should do the same.

The program allows patrons to take home heirloom seeds, plant them in their gardens and then return to the library at the end of the season with seeds generated from the original plants, the Wisconsin State Journal reported.

The La Crosse Public Library began a seed program in February following a year of research and planning, spokeswoman Kelly Becker said. The program has proven popular because people are increasingly interested in eating local and knowing where their food is coming from.

Since its launch, the La Crosse seed library has shared more than 600 seeds.



"There has been a lot of interest," Becker said. "We were almost overwhelmed at first." At least three other libraries in Green Lake, La Farge and Wonewoc have similar programs, said Martha Van Pelt, director of the South Central Library System.

The Mount Horeb Public Library hopes to start a seed-sharing program next spring, library director Jessica Williams said. She predicted it would do well because of the area's agrarian roots.

Her library plans to start educating patrons this fall on how to grow and care for the seeds, and then begin sharing seeds by the start of planting season. She said it was too early to say how many seeds the library will share and whether the library will acquire them by purchase or donation.

One source the library is considering is Seed Savers Exchange, an Iowa-based nonprofit that works to conserve endangered crops by growing and sharing heirloom seeds and plants.

"The idea is a seed itself — it has to grow," Williams said.

The Madison Public Library system also is looking into whether a seed-sharing library might be sustainable, said Michael Spelman, the supervisor of the Goodman South branch. He said he liked the concept but he wanted to be sure it could succeed along with the library other programs.

"This is one more new thing you might be doing. Can we do that well right now?" Spelman asked. "We really want to try and knock it out of the park, and that's how you do something successful."
